Affinity for Cyclone Athletics Kicks Off Student Success

Terry Voy will never forget meeting former lowa State University assistant football coach Arch Steele for the first time.

The encounter happened in the early 1960s when Voy was a high school football player in the Ackley–Geneva Community School District. One day, Steele marched into the school's locker room and introduced himself to Voy.

"It kind of floored me," Voy recalled. "I said 'What in the heck are you doing here?'"

Steele responded that he wanted to talk to him about the possibility of playing college football for lowa State — a very exciting opportunity for Voy, as he wasn't planning on attending college because he couldn't afford it.

The chance to play a collegiate sport would alter everything. Voy ultimately received a football

scholarship, enabling him to move to Ames and continue playing the sport he loved.

As a linebacker and member of special teams, Voy worked hard to become a three-year letter-winner. One of his favorite memories of being a Cyclone student-athlete was working out in State Gym during the winter, back when it had a dirt floor. He remembered leaving practice with dirt covering his face and body.

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Voy received a bachelor's degree in physical education in 1969 and a master's degree in industrial education in 1980. He spent his career working in the school transportation sector, including as director of a project he helped start that created a driving simulation for school bus driver training. Voy also served as a school transportation consultant with the lowa Department of Education for nearly 30 years and as the director of school transportation services for the lowa Association of School Boards.

No matter where life has taken him and his wife, Sherry, the couple has remained loyal and avid Cyclone fans, holding season tickets to both football and basketball games.

For Voy, the choice to create a scholarship at Iowa State was guided by his desire to help student-athletes with a background similar to his – someone from a small Iowa school district who may otherwise be unable to afford school.

"I'm hoping it has an impact the same way it impacted me," he said. "We could see the good being done and the need for scholarships for incoming athletes, particularly football. We thought we would do something along those lines, so we established the Terry and Sherry Voy Football Scholarship."

The couple supports the scholarship through annual cash gifts and has made a gift in their estate to fund it in the future.

When **Trevor Downing** was growing up outside of Creston, Iowa, his parents had a unique way of grounding him if he got in trouble. They would take away his chance to work on the family's corn and soybean farm.

Farming is the Iowa State senior's passion. So, too, is football. Downing said he enjoys both activities because they're similarly about working toward a common goal.

Downing, an offensive lineman, got into the sport in elementary school and was drawn to play at lowa State because of the football coaching staff. Yet the reason he was able to play college ball at all was because of support from the Terry and Sherry Voy Football Scholarship.

"If I didn't have the football scholarship, I wouldn't have been able to come to Iowa State and may have attended a community college,"

said Downing, who is majoring in criminal justice. "The scholarship opened the doors for me."

Those opportunities have enabled him to develop lifelong friendships with many of his teammates.

"There is great camaraderie on the team," Downing said. "It is player-driven, but the coaches really help foster it. When 90 percent of the players come to Ames, they are moving many miles away from home, so there is an instant bond among us."

As a Cyclone football player, Downing has had the unique opportunity to walk out of the tunnel right before game time and see the mass of cardinal and gold spread throughout the stands, cheering at a thunderous volume. And it's thanks to Terry and Sherry Voy that he'll have those memories to hold forever.



You don't have to be an expert to create a successful estate plan.


All you need are four essential documents. The office of gift planning has helped supporters like you use their estate plans to support lowa State students.

- Last will and testament and/or trust Controls how your assets, such as money and property, are distributed after your lifetime. - **Durable power of attorney for finances –** Names a person who will have the legal right to handle financial matters on your behalf if you are unable to do so.
- Durable power of attorney for health care Also known as a health care proxy, this document addresses all medical treatment. It names one or more individuals you trust to make medical decisions on your behalf if you are incapacitated.
- Living will/advance directive Documents your wishes regarding life-sustaining care.

TWO SMART WAYS TO SUPPORT IOWA STATE STUDENTS THIS YEAR

We know that your decision to support lowa State comes from the heart. A bonus is that your gift may also qualify for a tax break this year when you itemize deductions on your federal income tax return.

CONSIDER THESE SIMPLE GIFT IDEAS:

IRA Distribution

- If you are 59½ or older, you can take a distribution from your IRA and then make a gift to the Iowa State University Foundation without penalty. If you itemize your deductions, you can take a charitable deduction for the amount.
- If you are 70½ or older, you can give any amount up to \$100,000 per year from your IRA directly to the foundation. You will not pay income taxes on the transfer. If you are 72 or older, you can use this transfer to satisfy your required minimum distribution.

Appreciated Stock

You may enjoy two tax benefits with a gift of appreciated stock: Avoid paying taxes on the appreciated value, and qualify for an income tax charitable deduction based on today's market value, when you itemize.

For your donation to qualify this year, we must receive your gift by December 31. If you have check-writing privileges on your IRA, please mail your check by December 18 to allow time to process your gift. Complete all transfers of appreciated stock by December 31.

HOW TO REMEMBER IOWA STATE UNIVERSITY IN YOUR WILL OR TRUST

Share the following language with your estate planning attorney to add the Iowa State University Foundation to your will or living trust.

I give, devise and bequeath to the Iowa State University Foundation, a not-for-profit corporation existing under the laws of the State of Iowa and located at Ames, Iowa, _____ (percent of my estate, dollars, property, securities, etc.) to be used for _____ (however you wish for your gift to be used) at Iowa State University.
